Dear Latvian-Americans and our friends abroad,

On this 102th anniversary of Latvia's independence, I address you from Washington, DC, where I live and where we are enjoying a beautiful autumn with colorful foliage. Colorful leaves always remind me of our Latvian holidays – Lāčplēša Day and Latvian Independence Day on November 18.

We are proud to be working with all of you. We strive to be your partners and an organization that can unite all of our diverse interests and needs. But we all have a common mission – to protect and preserve our sense of belonging to Latvia. I hope, that during this time of self-isolation, we will be reminded of how important to your lives are our Latvian friends, communities and organizations.
